
WHAT IS DACA?

DEFERRED ACTION FOR CHILDHOOD ARRIVALS (DACA)

Immigration policy put in place by President Obama in 2012 as an executive action that granted a <u>two-year work permit</u> and <u>exemption for deportation</u> for individuals who arrived to the US as children (16th years of age or younger) before June 2007.

DACA BENEFITS

- Protection from deportation for two years
- Access to a social security number
- Access to a state ID and driver license (only in some states)
- Two-year work permit
- Access to higher education and in-state tuition (NOT federal funding)



WHO QUALIFIED FOR DACA?

- Individuals who entered the US before the age of 16 on June 15, 2012.
- Currently in school or have a GED certificate, or have been honorably discharge from the Coast Guard or the Armed forces.
- Individuals without a criminal record.
- Individuals who do not pose a threat to national security.



WHO BENEFITS FROM DACA?

- Approx. 750,000 young people have been approved for DACA
- A large percentage of DACA recipients are college students



WHAT DACA IS NOT?

DACA IS NOT

- DACA is NOT a law or regulation
- Does NOT confer permanent legal status
- Does NOT offer a path to citizenship
- Is not a free access for undocumented immigrants to federal funding and resources
- DACA is not only for Mexicans (Latina/os)

WHAT IS HOUSE BILL 1079?

HB 1079

- In 2003, the Washington State Legislature approved House Bill 1079, which made higher education affordable for undocumented students who graduated from a Washington State high school.
- Because HB 1079 was approved as state law, 1079 students are considered "residents" for purposes of higher education.
- 1079 students are permitted to pay "in-state" tuition, or "resident," tuition rates, to attend Washington public colleges and universities.

REAL HOPE ACT (SB6523)

- In 2014, WA State Legislature approved SB6523 (The Real Hope Act)
- Allows undocumented students to apply for state-funded financial aid for college if students qualify for in-state tuition under SB1079



WASHINGTON'S RURAL ECONOMY DEPENDS ON UNDOCUMENTED CHEAP LABOR


NATIONAL STATISTICS TOP COUNTRIES OF ORIGIN FOR DACA STUDENTS

DACA NATIONAL STATISTICS POPULATION BY STATE, 2016







STEREOTYPES ABOUT DACA/1079 STUDENTS & THEIR FAMILIES

STEREOTYPES ABOUT UNDOCUMENTED IMMIGRANTS

- Criminals
- Freeloaders who are taking advantage of all social services (schools, health services, housing, social security, etc.)
 without paying taxes
- Taking jobs from US citizens and bringing down wages
- Undocumented is incorrectly associated with being Mexican and Spanish speakers

CHALLENGES FOR COLLEGES & UNIVERSITIES

CHALLENGES FOR EWU

 Institution's faculty and staff doesn't know exactly who are DACA students.

Lack of a centralized or clear path of support

 We can safely assume that EWU has a significant percentage of student & staff population who have some sort of familial relation to an undocumented individual(s).

Uncertainty!

CHALLENGES FOR EWU

• It is unclear whether the new administration's immigration policies will target students or what form such actions might take.

• Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE)-has a Sensitive Locations Policy that limits enforcement actions at sensitive locations such as college and university campuses.

FEARS OF DACA STUDENTS & UNDOCUMENTED IMMIGRANT COMMUNITIES

CONSEQUENCES

- It is very likely that the President-elect Trump will end the DACA program when he takes office on January 20, 2017 leaving 750,000 young people with their families vulnerable for deportation.
- DACA recipients voluntarily provided all their personal information to the federal government, which makes them and their families an easy target for deportation.
- DACA students will loose their access to work permits, school, social security, and their state issued IDs.

FEARS

- Uncertainty!!!
- Deportation to countries where they don't have connections anymore because they have grown-up in the US
- Racial profiling
- Bigotry and hate crimes
- Family separation
- Loosing their livelihood, community, friends, etc.

SANCTUARY MOVEMENT

ACROSS US COLLEGES AND UNIVERSITIES

"SANCTUARY CAMPUS"

- Sanctuary Campus Petitions
 - 125 Petitions without responses
 - 49 colleges have committed some level of support
 - 10 colleges have declared Sanctuary status



 Sanctuary Campus Petitions are NOT limited to undocumented students, but it also is inclusive of vulnerable communities such as LGTBQ+, Muslim, women, African American, immigrants, allies.



"SANCTUARY"

- The word is commonly associated with a sacred space or a refuge.
- "Sanctuary Cities" still don't have a clear meaning or agreed upon definition.
 - Encourage undocumented immigrants to seek help and cooperate with law enforcement.
 - City resources are not allocated to enforce federal immigration laws

ECONOMIC CRISIS OR GLOBAL FINANCIAL CRISIS




□ Considered to be the worst financial downturn in the U.S. since 1930s



EFFECTS OF RECESSION ON IMMIGRANTS

- US deportations of undocumented immigrants reached records high in 2008-2013.
- The average of deportations during this period was approximately 396,000 individuals per year = more than 2 million people were deported in 6 years.
- Family separation became the main cause for voluntary deportation for immigrants.
- During this period more undocumented immigrants left the US than came into the US

DEFERRED ACTION FOR PARENTS OF AMERICANS AND LAWFUL PERMANENT RESIDENTS OR DEFERRED ACTION FOR PARENTAL ACCOUNTABILITY

(DAPA)

DEFERRED ACTION FOR PARENTAL ACCOUNTABILITY (DAPA)

- November 20, 2014, President Obama announced an executive action for the expansion of DACA program (2012) for parents.
 - For parents of US citizens or legal permanent resident children



DEFERRED ACTION FOR PARENTAL ACCOUNTABILITY (DAPA) PROGRAM

DO YOUR PARENTS QUALIFY FOR DAPA? TO QUALIFY ONE MUST:



Be the parent of a child who was born on or before November 20, 2014 and who is a U.S. citizen or green card holder.



Have been in in the U.S. since January 1, 2010(the past 5 years).



Be in the U.S. on November 20, 2014.



Have no lawful immigration status on November 20, 2014.



Pass security and criminal background checks.

Application forms will be available May, 2015 at a cost of \$465
